



2024 Capital BudgetPhase 2: Public Engagement Report

Background & Objectives

Background

A municipality's annual budget is an important policy document that dictates how the City will collect and allocate resources to best improve and maintain City services and infrastructure for the community.

The City of Belleville's budget is broken down into two components: capital and operating. While residents have always been welcome to take part in the budget process by providing their feedback to their council representatives, there has been a significant effort in recent years to encourage more thorough public engagement in the process.

In 2023, Finance engaged communications to craft educational messaging about the budget process. This involved building out a webpage and content with information around what each budget entails, and the approval process. The goal for the 2024 budget process was to focus on further education and direct engagement.

Staff have decided to take a two-phase approach for the 2024 budget process. The first phase of the process was a short, high-level Preliminary Capital Budget Survey to gauge residents capital spending priorities. Questions in the survey looked at ranking and prioritizing City infrastructure, current satisfaction levels of each, as well as areas and tolerance for increased/decreased infrastructure investment, to name a few. This phase also included development of Budget 101 documents to provide a further breakdown of the process for residents.

The second phase in the engagement approach came closer to the finalization of the budget and was a more specific survey of the proposed capital budget. The 2024 Draft Capital Budget and Asset Management Plan Survey broke down some of the capital budget items and allowed residents to weigh in on the specific projects identified by staff in their draft budgets.

Objectives

The goal behind this year's communications and engagement strategy was as follows:

- Provide residents with additional educational material and resources around the budget process.
- Encourage direct engagement from as many residents as possible.
- Provide council and staff with public feedback to help shape a budget and plan that best serves their residents.



Engagement Strategy

Timeline

- June 27 & July 10 public engagement plan and timeline approved by Finance Committee and Council.
- August 14 & 28 Preliminary public feedback and recommended guidelines presented to Finance Committee and Council.
- October through November Internal draft Capital Budget deliberations.
- 2024 Draft Capital Budget Dec. 6 Agenda posted Nov. 17
- December 6 Capital Budget Council meeting, presentation of public feedback, and subsequent adoption.








Survey Summary

The 2024 Draft Capital Budget & Asset Management Survey ran from Nov. 16 to 30. Below is a summary of the 122 total responses and feedback received through the survey period. Highlights of comments under "Please Specify" for questions 3, 4, 5 and 6 can be found in beneath each question. See Appendix A for detailed responses.

Q2: While considering the above-noted guidelines, are you generally satisfied with the projects included in the 2024 draft capital budget?




Q3: Feel free to provide additional comment on your response to Question #2 above.

While there was an array of comments, below are highlights from respondents who were not generally satisfied with the 2024 Draft Capital Budget:

- There is a general misconception of the following topics that reiterate the need for staff and Council to encourage ratepayers to review the City's Budget 101 documents at Belleville.ca/Budget: what is included in the capital versus the operating budget, the segregation between tax versus user rate-funded asset categories (i.e. property tax does not fund water infrastructure), funding strategies for growth (i.e. use of development charges) and non-growth (i.e. property taxes and user rates) capital projects.
- Capital projects are not getting completed in a timely manner.
- The 2024 Draft Capital Budget is focused on one project (i.e. Avonlough Street Pumping Station, Bridge Street/Sidney Street). Furthermore, it does not sufficiently address existing core infrastructure (i.e. roads).
- Hillcrest Park completion should be included in the draft budget.
- Police & Fire should have an increased allocation of funds. Facilities & Parks should be reduced. While others expressed that Police's fleet & equipment allocation should be reduced.
- The overall draft capital budget is too low considering costs continue to rise.


Q4: In your opinion, are there any service areas that you think require general immediate attention but may not be appropriately reflected in this budget?

- Stormwater: Alexander Street


Q5: Do you feel adequately informed about the City's capital budget and the projects included? If not, please elaborate.



Below are highlights from those who do not feel adequately informed about the City's capital budget and projects included:

- It is difficult to locate the draft capital projects list. Respondents were unaware of capital meeting agenda document that was linked within the survey.
- There was insufficient information to support capital projects.
- There is a need for periodic Townhall meetings to discuss progress on capital projects.
- There should be more transparency around the capital budget for Police.


Q6: Are there any specific topics surrounding the City's capital budget and process that you wish you had more information and background on? And if so, please elaborate.




Below are highlights from those wishing to have more information regarding capital budget:

- Increased rationale and business case for projects to move forward (i.e. tax implications).


Q7: In your opinion, how would you prioritize the following aspects of City services tied to capital infrastructure (with 1 being the highest)?







Q8: In your opinion, how would you rank the following areas of the City's capital investment (with 1 being the highest)?

- Rural residents are fed up and sick and tired with paying for downtown! Enough is enough!
- I attend the parks / trails on at least 250 days per annum. The users of splash pads is minimal. Belch park does not require a splash pad. Playground equipment can be utilized 7-8 months per year as opposed to spash pads 3 months per year. The city spent money at the Riverside parking lots that is luxury not a neccessity. The funding required should be acquired from the actual users of boat docks/piers.
- Many roads need work try driving across Tracey Street, sunken potholes everywhere. Contrary
 to what it might seem like on FB and according to the Belleville Police Services Board, we are not

- Seems the post covid era requires an increase in these services
- Re-routing of funding from police to social services and affordable housing to reduce the need for police
 enforcement. I would love to see the Zwick's trail extend further west along the waterfront for a longer
 recreational trail. Not increased transit but increased bicycle infrastructure as a safe and affordable
 transportation option especially given the current economics. Bridges need to be maintained for
 everyone's safety no collapsing bridges please as the infrastructure of cities across North American
 cities ages.
- Maintain needed services and decrease those not required as offend.
- Harbours and docks, least of issues need addressing. Information technology, where are the security cameras, privacy, data maintenance. Cost is more than having real people perform security.
- Portion of Police and fire budget should be diverted to related high school education, AI surveillances, door to door education and any other related preventive strategies and reason for my decrease to traditional method of spending. Increase in IT is the way to move forward for the next generation and slowly but surely there needs to be an increase in IT spending after formal need and assessment to create a value in terms to speed, precision and cost savings without compromising on the deliverables

- Harbours should be 100% funded by user fees. IT don't make a nanny state. Stop with community safety zone cameras.
- Many roads are in bad shape to the point of increasing cost of repairs on vehicles. Also they are bad enough that the roads cost even more to repair in the long run especially with our freeze/thaw climate in the winter.
- Accessible parking for those seeking access to healthcare, parks for all people to enjoy nature should be
 a priority. Decrease police and security spending, because the average citizen is either deeply in debt or
 rapidly eating through their savings just to exist. The last thing we need is criminalizing people instead of
 preventing desperation 'crimes'. Harbours are play areas for the wealthy, and if they want to improve it,
 they should foot the bill themselves without every other taxpayer. If they refuse, reclaim the harbour and

- Belleville Police Services do not under any circumstances require 1 million dollars for fleet & equipment. We also should be looking at a more cost effective option for wastewater transportation when we have a water treatment facility in Belleville. Things should be considered regarding cost management. Especially considering the public library is only receiving a budget of 200000 whereas new vehicles for police when some are practically brand new is given 1 mil.
- I think it is fiscally irresponsible to completely slash the capital budget as much as is being proposed. Whatever we "saved" this year will likely be even more expensive the following year. Spending as much money as is being proposed on one street in the city seems like a bad idea to me

- Expand details for Police Budget.

- Belleville is spending too much money as my taxes are \$5,000.00 a year for a 1285 square foot house; neighboring municipalities have much lower taxes. I don't have an issue with projects that are necessary with the proper return on investment analysis but obviously Belleville is spending too much money on both capital projects and operational costs. I also do not buy the argument that projects should be done because Belleville is going to get money from higher levels of government; Belleville councilors need to remember that the money only comes from one pocketbook (mine) at the end of the day. Councilors need to think of the City treasury as the same as your own bank account; don't spend the money if we can't afford it.
- As a disabled person and a parent of a disabled child who uses a wheelchair, we frequent BGH and
 are consistently denied van accessible parking. Every single time we are forced to either get a ticket
 for parking on North Street or circle the hospital lot endlessly and be late for our appointments. While
 there is some accessible parking, there is clearly not enough. We have already spoken several times with
 hospital leadership and it is clear that the City and BGH must collaborate to serve the public who are
 disabled and in need of access to healthcare. Canada's population is aging, Covid will lead to even more
 disabilities for thousands in our area, and people like us continue to be either an afterthought or not
 considered whatsoever.
- less monies spent on city facilities and parks, and put that money toward the police and fire department
- I would like Item 10(Library) ranked higher
- Generally a good budget, but I have yet to see any items in Capital or Administration budgets that are on Homelessness specific.

- All the money is wasted on Ribbon cutting and should be 1 councillor or 2 for each ward.


- This vague survey doesn't provide a lot of information behind the 'why's'.

The recent addition trail extension west of Hermicer is beautiful, but now it would be nice to upgrade portions of the waterfront trail as it is becoming quite bumpy and isn't the most level of paved trails. There is overgrowth on parts of the trail that are not being maintained, additional signage might be good so people no not to loiter or even the "rules" of the trail.
